WELCOME TO THE THIRD ANNUAL CALSOAP LA COLLEGE AND CAREER EXPO!

The CALSOAP LA College and Career Expo is an event open to the public, although our primary focus is the underserved students of Los Angeles Unified School District (LAUSD). As the second-largest school district in the country, LAUSD currently enrolls over 420,000 students. Over three quarters of the district's students come from low-income households, and the majority of students are Black or Latinx. Sadly, LAUSD has struggled with substantial achievement gaps for Black, Latinx, and low-income students. LAUSD reports that only 60 percent of students exhibit UC and CSU readiness, which drops when accounting for factors like race, ethnicity, foster system involvement, disability, gender, immigration status, and socioeconomic disadvantage. Through the Expo, we hope to bring you resources about colleges and universities, career and technical education pathways, scholarship opportunities, and much more so that you can successfully set and reach your academic goals. CASH FOR COLLEGE: PAYING FOR COLLEGE

When you begin your FAFSA or CADAA application you will need several documents. Here is a list for future reference.



FAFSA DOCUMENTS LIST

CASH FOR COLLEGE: PAYING FOR COLLEGE

Financial aid is funds given to students and families that helps them pay for college. Your financial aid package is structured in the form of:

Grants: free money provided to students attending college or career school by the federal government that generally does not have to be repaid.



Scholarships: Aid from a university or private / organization that does not have to be paid back.



Work Study: Federal Work-Study provides part-time jobs for undergraduate and graduate students with financial need.



Loans: Borrowed money that must be repaid beginning 6 months after college graduation.



When do I apply for financial aid?

The financial aid application opens for priority aid each year from October 1 to March 2. You apply during the spring semester of your senior year!

What is the difference between the Free Application For Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and the California Dream Act application (CADAA)?

Students should only complete one of the applications (not both), according to the citizenship requirements below:

- 1. You are eligible to complete the FAFSA at www.fafsa.gov if you are a:
- · U.S Citizen
- · Permanent Resident
- · Eligible non-citizen
- · T Visa holder
- 2. You are eligible to complete the CADAA at https://dream.csac.ca.gov if you are:
- Undocumented
- Have a valid or expired DACA
- U Visa holders

FAMILIES

Meet often with the school counselor to discuss your child's academic progress. Attend school-sponsored field trips to colleges and participate in workshops about college preparation. Help your child maintain a high Grade Point Average (GPA), especially in English and mathematics. Math and foreign language classes begin to count for college eligibility as early as 7th and 8th grade, so monitor those grades too! Encourage your child to participate in academic enrichment and extracurricular activities during out-of-school time. If your child has taken Algebra I, encourage him/her to take the PSAT exam in 8th grade (October). Explore the high school options that best suit your child's needs and interests (e.g. charter schools, magnet schools, etc.). Visit your child's future high school and meet with a guidance counselor before she/he begins high school. In High School... Meet often with school counselor(s) to discuss your child's academic progress. Tell the counselors that you want your child to prepare for college. Help your child maintain a 3.0+ GPA in college preparatory (A-G) classes. Ask about programs and activities to help you and your child transition smoothly into high school. Learn early about financial aid options and Expected Family Contribution (EFC) by visiting the Federal Student Aid website at: https://studentaid.ed.gov/sa/fafsa Attend workshops to learn about financial aid and the college and career preparation process. Encourage your child to participate in academic enrichment and extracurricular activities (i.e. summer programs, college classes, etc.). Help your child keep track of application deadlines for scholarships, colleges, and financial aid. During the fall semester of senior year, encourage your child to apply to a variety of colleges. During the spring semester of senior year, apply for federal and state financial aid. Visit college campuses with your child, and encourage them to keep all options open. Help your child select the college that best meets his/her interests and career goals.

- How many students are enrolled?
- Are you on a semester or quarter system?

HOW DO I APPLY FOR ADMISSION

- Where, when, and how do I apply for admission?
- When do I have to submit my transcripts, AP test scores and other admission materials?
- When will I be notified if I have been admitted or denied?
- If I am denied admission, can I appeal? By when?
- What other requirements do I need?
- Do I need to have a major before I apply? Can I apply as undeclared?

WHAT ABOUT YOUR PROGRAMS

- Do you offer my major?
- What programs do you offer that will support my major?
- · Does my major offer evening, weekend, or online courses?
- Can I take courses in my major during the summer?
- Are there internship opportunities available on campus or in the community?
- Is my major impacted?

ANYTHING ELSE I NEED TO KNOW

- How do I make arrangements to visit your campus and meet with an admissions counselor?
- Do you offer housing for freshman/transfer students? Is it guaranteed?
- Do you offer payment plans for tuition?
- What is the student life like?
- Who do I contact to get more information?
